

Preparing Students For Jobs That Don't Exist Yet

We want to share with you the current thinking on jobs of the future and skills that will be in demand in the next 20 years. Whilst we can't tell you what these jobs are or which ones will disappear, we can look at the trends and see the direction of employment and career opportunity.

One of the easiest ways to begin thinking about future careers is to focus on what may be a problem in the future and invent a job that will solve it. For example, if cars are to be autonomous (drive themselves) we will need the services of a Smart Car Interior Designer who redesign what the inside of a car will look like.

Those educated are more likely to find jobs and secure employment than those that are not. However, education is not a guarantee to a job. Employment and education are linked and having in demand qualifications means secure employment.

New technologies will make some occupations redundant. Automation, robotics and artificial intelligence will impact on existing jobs but many new jobs will be created using these technologies. The rise of new disruptive technologies will occur quickly and there's a shortage of people with the skills to manage and transition to new products and services.

Not all jobs will disappear. Just as not all jobs disappeared when computers were introduced. Today computers help people do a better job; so, automation and robotics will help you do a better job in the future.

Of the non-technology jobs, occupations such as Aged & Child Care, Education, Training, Sales, Construction & Trades, Business and Personal Services will grow. Those studying science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) will find more jobs require this knowledge and expertise. Almost all jobs will require you to be digitally smart and expect you to know more than just the basics.

Not all jobs require a University degree so consider your options in vocational, apprenticeship and skills training. Most countries have a shortage of skilled labour so there is opportunity for employment.



How You Learn

Driver Analysers are ‘results driven’ learners.

We all learn differently and our brain processes information according to four basic questions we ask ourselves. Why, What, Who and How. Driver Analysers ask ‘What, e.g. “What needs to be done”. As a person of action, the “let’s get on with it” approach is what you prefer. It’s direct, doesn’t waste time and you get a swift result.

Because you learn best by doing, work out how you can implement what you’ve just learnt as soon as practical. This will engage you and you’ll see the result of your new knowledge. This will encourage you to master the course and become an expert. If you can, watch a video on the subject, Driver Analysers learn through visual experience. For study you’ll be required to read a lot. Reading is not your preferred way of learning.



Driver Analysers often do their best thinking when they are talking, so where you can read out loud and ask your teacher or tutor questions.



Being Realistic

As a Driver Analyser you have a natural tendency to take on more because you like to be challenged.

You like to get things done sooner rather than later, and you enjoy the fast pace. Most of all you expect to succeed and get results.

Make sure you know how much time is required so you can balance study with other commitments. For example, if you do other things after school hours such as sport, belong to clubs, have hobbies, help at home or in the family business, you must set time aside for study.



Don’t extend your commitments and take on more that you can cope with.



Goal Setting

Study is a discipline and to stay focused you must set goals. Setting goals is part of human nature, and Driver Analysers are particularly goal oriented.

However, even with set goals there are times when we do not meet them. One of the reasons we fail is self-control. Self-control is the ability to hang in and stay on course despite temptations, distractions and the demands of competing interests.

As a Driver Analyser your goals must be specific. You need to focus on exactly what you want to achieve and it should be performance based. Write these goals down and pin them up on the wall so you see them every day. Make sure your goals are results oriented. Reward yourself on results. Whilst you have a big picture view of where you want to be, you should also break down each step into distinct tasks so you remain focussed and feel you are achieving to keep you focused and on track.



Think of your goals like a “Flight Plan”, life is a journey and you are the pilot. You can’t take off on your journey until you have a flight plan. Where are you going, what course will you fly, how long will it take and do you have enough fuel?



4 Managing Time

The most common culprit of time wasting is technology :) TV, internet, apps and social media. It's very easy to get distracted and spend a lot of time on your PC, tablet or smartphone.

We are not saying you should stop using these devices but suggest that you limit the time you allocate to entertainment and be aware that study is the best use of time at your age.

Set aside time for study just as you would for attending school. Give yourself ample time to sit down and read through your materials, so you understand everything clearly. Don't be in a hurry to get everything done immediately. Read homework assignments carefully and don't assume anything. **Be aware that Driver Analysers value achievement, and often jump in to a task before fully understanding what's required.**

Identify the time of day you will devote to studying. Ask yourself: are you a morning person or a night owl? Then schedule in your study at a time when you're performing at your peak. Set aside regular time for studying. Make sure you commit a regular number of hours per week to study.



As you get closer to exams you will need to allocate more time for review and to practise exams.

5 Staying Motivated

Study suits Driver Analysers who are self-starters and who really want to learn, but it can also be a challenge because all the motivation and discipline has to come from you.

As a Driver Analyser we expect you to be focused and results oriented. You don't delay which is in your favour when it comes to staying motivated. **"Do it now" is an excellent motto for Driver Analysers and will help you study and complete your assignments.**

6 Managing Stress

We all experience stress and conflict. It's common for stress to be the cause of conflict. As a Driver Analyser studying you have forces that you can't control as much as you'd like to and not being in control is one of your stress triggers.

Be aware that your normal expectation is for things to move along at a quick pace. Be careful, because your need to keep things moving can result in your being too quick to complete and submit your assignments.



Slow down and review. Don't assume. Misunderstandings can lead to poor results.



Communication Is Key

You know how curious parents and family are. They want to know what you want to be when you grow up, what you learnt at school today and lots of other such questions.

They do this because they care about you and are concerned for your future. **So, if you're having problems at school or with a particular subject please tell them. It's important that you communicate with them about what's going on in your life and at school and study.**

If you have tutor you are fortunate. Tutors are there to help you. Tutors are one-to-one teachers who you must connect with to get the best from. Tutors with personality that match yours are always a big bonus. Tutor personality plays a major role in how effectively they communicate with you, as the student.



Have you noticed how some of your favourite teachers are probably your favourite because their personality was just like yours?



Study Space

Make a place to study that's yours. Look around where you live and find a place to claim as your own. This will be your study zone.

In a small home or with a large family this might be difficult. There might be a time of day or night when it's quieter for you to study. Alternatively, there might be a library or community hall or space that you can go to.

Being a Driver Analyser, you want to be in control and having your own study place will ensure you focus on study.



After you've claimed your study space, make sure everyone understands it is your study spot.



Grit Is Everything

Most successful people and self-made millionaires attribute their success to hard work. They repeatedly say "I wasn't smarter or better than anyone else, but I was willing to work harder than they were".

Hard work is not always physical effort. It's about hanging in there and figuring things out. Regardless of your personality type, research shows that GRIT is a major factor in success and achievement. Hanging in there, finishing what you start, not giving up and setting goals make all the difference to who you will become.

Grit is about not letting go no matter what. The amount of effort you are prepared to put in determines if you finish high school, graduate or do well in your career.

The Four Personality Styles

This guide uses the four personality styles used in the MyCareerMatch report. Whilst children are a combination of styles, the four dominant styles; Driver, Promoter, Supporter and Analyser influence the most. Each child is a blend of these four personality styles and the MyCareerMatch report graph displays the percentage of each child's four styles.

Driver

Drivers are adventurers and are always looking for excitement so can't sit still. They want to test their limits and enjoy anything that goes fast. They are natural born risk takers who act bold and are often hyperactive. They want to take control and be in charge. They may not follow the rules and are not interested in a tidy room or remembering schedules.

Promoter

Promoters are socialisers and have a vivid imagination and sense of fantasy. As young children they love to have stories read to them. They live in a world of make believe. Promoters are emotional people and use their gut instinct. They talk a lot. They are enthusiastic and can be oversensitive. They like the limelight and enjoy being the centre of attention.

Supporter

Supporters are helpers and are naturally concerned and responsible children. They follow the rules and are happy to please others. They respect their elders, parents and teachers. They are dependable. At home Supporters are busy kids. They enjoy being given responsibility for tasks. At school they do well and work hard. They worry about change and prefer routines.

Analyser

Analysers are thinkers and are precise, neat, orderly and tidy. They enjoy figuring out how things work and ask lots of questions. They are non-aggressive and avoid conflict. They excel at subjects that require thoughtful, logical and creative solutions. They hate taking risks and are not spontaneous or outwardly enthusiastic. Analysers are perfectionists and set high standards.



Create A Positive Climate At Home And School

- Driver Analysers are active children who like to take risks and are competitive.
- They need opportunities to be active.
- Driver Analysers are entrepreneurs.
- Bored Driver Analysers can cause trouble! Have activity plans for the weekend and evenings after school (homework permitting).
- Get them involved in sporting organisations or other social groups, where they can master new skills, compete and burn energy.
- Answer their questions. Drivers usually ask “what” as in “what needs to be done”. They want to know now so they can get on with it.
- Give them opportunities to be involved in the decision-making process. It is in their nature to make their own decisions.
- If you want to have some control over their decisions, give them choices and ask them to choose. They’ll cooperate when they’ve been involved in the decision making.
- If they question the way things are done, listen to them, they may actually have a better way. If not, explain why not, be logical, brief and non-emotional.
- Agree to house rules. Explain “why” these rules are in place. Don’t overdo the rules!
- Vary routines. Your child loves variety so changing the way you do things will make it enjoyable.
- Your child functions better with lots to do. Give them multiple projects or problems to work on.

Help Your Child Develop

- Your child likes to be challenged.
- Help them understand that they need to be nice to others and appreciate that everyone else is not always like them.
- Your child is a combination of two styles. Drivers want to do it now and Analysers want to get it right. This combination is excellent for business.
- Allow them to make choices and be accountable for those choices.
- Teach them to accept the importance of limits and boundaries.
- Work on ways to constructively deal with anger. They can be quick tempered and aggressive if they don’t get their own way.
- Help them understand that occasional failure is a part of life and doesn’t mean they are a failure. As much as they wish, they can’t win every time.
- Teach them to take time out and relax more.
- Show them how to be patient and listen to others.



Communicate In The Following Way

- Be brief, direct and to the point. Driver Analysers don't like idle chatter.
- Speed up your conversation to keep them engaged
- Avoid repeating yourself, they got you the first time.
- In communicating your ideas highlight the logical benefits to them.
- Give them choices. Do you want to do this or that or would you prefer to do it later?
- When it is time for action, give them short commands such as, "clean your room!", "bedtime!"
- When correcting behaviours focus on specifics, explain exactly what needs to be done.
- Reason with them sensibly and logically. Be brief, factual and to the point.
- Let them know who's in charge as they will often challenge your authority.
- In an attempt to discipline, they may openly question the way you want things to be and attempt to negotiate for less. Listen, then give an appropriate answer as you would an adult.
- Don't threaten. Power struggles over control are the most frequent source of friction and conflict.
- Recognise and reward achievement.

- You have amazing energy.
- You are brilliant at sticking to things and not giving up easily.
- You're very independent and resourceful.
- You play hard and compete to win.
- I really admire your determination and your ability to get things done correctly and on time.

- I like that you are independent and capable.
- You tackle new situations fearlessly.
- You respond quickly to a situation and figure out solutions.
- I admire that you express yourself honestly and say exactly what you think.
- I like that you can't be pushed into doing things you don't want to do.
- I like the way you handle things on your own.
